

# **Beatrix Farrand's Legacy**

Beatrix Farrand believed in the great importance of education as providing the groundwork for professional work in landscape architecture. This spirit, expressed in her motto "Give me understanding and I shall live" placed Farrand above most of her fellow practitioners because it embodied her life long dedication to the pursuit of design as an expression of emotion and intellect.

It was her intention that the plans and records of her professional work, and her extensive professional library would be available for study by scholars, practitioners and students of landscape design. She intended to have her entire collection available for this purpose at Reef Point, her home in Bar Harbor, Maine. Because of inadequate finances, this grand plan was not able to be carried out and the collection was broken up with the major portion of it going to the undergraduate program in Landscape Architecture at the University of California, Berkeley.

Her work as a landscape architect reflected thoughtfulness and seriousness of purpose and is particularly exemplified in the many outstanding designs she executed for academic institutions, especially Yale and Princeton Universities. These designs were representative of the relationship of art and science. She studied plants with the eye of a botanist, she knew a vast number of plants, both native and exotic and cultivated as many as she could at Reef Point. Yet, in her design work, she used an extremely limited palette, enabling a small number of species to work harmoniously in color and texture, in order to further the design intention, with each plant making a maximum contribution to the overall concept.

There are other, more personal considerations of historical importance. She was representative of women who chose professional careers at the end of the nineteenth century and she displayed several of the characteristics which made these women so exceptional. She had personal courage insofar as she retained her strong self-image in a professional world dominated by men. She made good decisions and wise choices throughout her professional life. One of the best was the example of Garland Farm. She created a place for herself at the end of her life which was a distillation of what had occurred in the eighty years before. She did this with grace and dignity and good design. We are most fortunate to carry on this legacy.

# **GF National Register Nomination**

The Maine Historic Preservation Commission, the state's historic resource agency, met in late January to consider significant historic resources in the state, including Garland Farm. After presentations and careful consideration, Garland Farm was unanimously recommended for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. The nomination now moves to Washington, D.C., where approval is expected by summer. The Commission nominated Garland Farm on the basis of its local and state historic significance. As a pending listed site, Garland Farm is awarded the protections of a fully listed National Register site. Summer celebration is anticipated for this recognition milestone for Beatrix Farrand and her last home.


# Save the Date: Saturday, August 6. 2005 Annual Meeting of the BFS


